However, there will be a small number of evacuees who continue to resist the offer of rental accommodation despite all efforts.  • The goal of supporting evacuees to accept housing provided by MBIE remains. However, the housing plan does have an end point. Where evacuees continue to decline an offer of permanent housing and / or refuse to move to 'stepping stone' accommodation, MBIE may cease to support the evacuees which may mean a small number of evacuees become reliant on the Ministry of Social Development's housing assistance.  • If this happens, MBIE has confirmed it will continue to provide the evacuee(s) with wrap-around resettlement support, such as education or language assistance, to increase the likelihood of securing a private rental. Plan change 61 was declined due to traffic effects and a lack of integration between the roading upgrades and the timing of the development. Auckland Council is delaying decisions on the other plan changes while they consider the implications of the Enabling Housing Supply Amendment Act.
